

Colorado Has A New Master of Wine

Ashley Hausman Vaughters earned the impressive credential after almost a decade of study and drinking more bottles than she can count.

Can you imagine studying for a test for eight years? How about a test that isn't even really one test, but rather three stages of testing that takes a minimum of three years to complete? That's just the tip of the cork when it comes to explaining the Institute of Masters of Wine's rigorous program, which is so daunting, only 46 U.S.-based wine pros have successfully earned its Master of Wine (MW) title since the first exam in 1953. But on September 3, Ashley Hausman Vaughters joined their prestigious ranks, passing the third and final stage to become the first MW in Colorado.

Vaughters, a Front Range wine rep for Old World Wine Imports and owner of Mistral Wine Co. (a consumer-facing education and consulting company), began working toward her MW in 2009 by tackling the many prerequisites necessary to apply for the program. "I started with Society of Wine Educators' [Certified Specialist of Wine program]," Vaughters says. "I got my level two sommelier certification through the Court of Master Sommeliers, and then started to work for the Wine & Spirit Education Trust diploma. I've been nonstop studying since 2009, really."


Schlachter seeks opportunities to get samples of Colorado's finest - in particular, the twelve wines selected during the annual Governor's Cup Competition - into the hands of the who's-who of the wine industry. Recently, Tim Mondavi, scion of Robert Mondavi and head of Continuum Estate winery, had sipped Colorado's wine wares and was impressed.


Colorado's 140 wineries are small mom-and-pop businesses compared to the wine giants of California and New York. Although increasingly recognized for their quality, the wines of the Centennial State remain a bargain. Colorado's sweet spot, says Schlachter, is wine in the \$20 bottle range. The same mid-priced, high-quality wine from a boutique winery in Napa Valley would cost \$40 a bottle

For fall's warm days and cool nights, Vaughters recommends borderline wines - fuller whites and lighter reds - that complement the flavors of autumn foods. "While it's still warm and we have the benefit of really great tomatoes still coming in," she explains, "if you have not embraced dry rosés yet, then I urge you to stop judging and thinking it's Grandma's zin." Rosé is a great wine to serve with food whose flavors fight with wine; it's perfect to pair with that luscious late-summer tomato.



Splitboarding is a fast-growing style of snowboarding, and Weston is leading the trend. A splitboard is designed for backcountry boarding. It splits in two to make two boards, sort of like skis, to help you with climbing, but then the board re-attaches to board downhill.

Weston's splitboards use sustainably farmed wooden cores and uses as much recycled materials as possible. It aims to be environmentally friendly. Not to mention a great ride. The Backwoods Splitboard was named Editor's Choice two vears in a row for Backcountry Masazine.

We asked three local experts for recommendations that will get you an A+ (or at least lots of pats on the back and requests for refills) at a variety of occasions. Welcome to your party cheat sheet.



GO LOCAL

Impress your friends with these seriously good sips from the Centennial State, provided by Kyle Schlachter, outreach coordinator for the Colorado Wine Industry Development Board.

Creekside Cabernet Franc, \$45

"It says it all on the label: Franc is 'Colorado's Cabernet.' Rarely bottled as a varietal by itself elsewhere in the world, this unique red grape variety ex-cels with smells of blackberry, allspice, cocoa and clove, with hints of coffee beans, yet tastes of black cherry, marionberry, pralines and pecans with hints of black olives on the palette."

Guy Drew Vineyards Syrah, \$18

"With mouth-watering dark berry and licorice flavors, a balanced acidity and a peppery, slightly smoky finish, this wine is great for your foodie friends who like having interesting wines with interesting foods. And this syrah pairs nicely with a whole range of nosh from lighter fare to rich, heavy meats."

Bookcliff Vineyards Riesling, \$14

Cc "Peach, apricot, green apple and pear fruit flavors abound in this sweet wine. The long, crisp finish makes it a great wine to have on its own or with a wide variety of spicy foods."

Infinite Monkey Theorem Bubbles Universe, \$55

"Sparkling wine is traditionally made from chardonnay or pinot noir, but this unique, high-quality bubbly from IMT is made from albariño and is the perfect wine to start off a party."

Two Rivers Winery and Chateau 2013 Port, \$14

"I can't think of a better way to end a dinner party than by breaking out a bottle of dessert wine. This velvety, ruby-styled port, with warm aromas of cocoa powder and mint that lead the way into sweet and spicy flavors including chocolate and wild berries, is very well balanced and just plain delicious. Pair with chocolate-covered strawberries or your favorite chocolate dessert—it also tastes great with books and fireplaces."



"We have wonderful soils in the Grand Valley, which are ideal for growing wine grapes," says Kaibab Sauvage, president of the Colorado Association for Viticulture and Enology, and owner of Colorado Vineyard Specialists, a viticultural management ompany. He noted many soils are mixed with eroded sedimen washed down from the mountains.

"This mixing with three different rock types and the components of an ancient sea bed combine to make wellained, fertile soils ideal for roducing magnificent wine

Owner Theresa High is defying expectations for Colorado wine, one locally grown grape at a time.

It started 30 years ago with a marriage proposal in France, in Roquebrune-Cap-Martin. "When Scott (High) proposed to me, he promised me a vineyard," Theresa recalls.

Scott and Theresa worked in the wine industry, and Scott eventually founded a Denver-based distribution company - Classic Wines -- in the 1990s. The couple never stopped dreaming of owning a vineyard.

In 1999, the Highs purchased a 15-acre peach orchard in Palisade, and resolved to continue growing peaches until they had the means to move to the Western Slope. It wasn't a bad gig: High Country Orchards and Vineyards has been the exclusive distributor of conventional Palisade peaches for Whole Foods Markets' Rocky Mountain Region since 2006.





teel wine tanks necessary for aging white varieties. The vineyard also acquired new French and American oak barrels, bringing their collection to about 250, kept in an underground cave cellar. Winemaking take up 8,000 to 10,000 square feet of space, Theresa estimates, including the winemaking facility, cave, and a dry goods storage area.

This season, Theresa and her team will use that space to produce approximately 14,000 cases of wine Grapes were harvested last year, between August and November, and white varieties are coming out of their tanks right about now, and running through the filtering and settling processes.

Many of the red grapes will age in their barrels until the summer - some won't come out for another two

At Colteris, different clones are put into separate tanks and barrels. And this is where the art of winemaking comes into play. Bo Felton, a recent California transplant and Colterris' new head winemaker blends clones to make unique varietals.

Few Bordeaux wines are composed of just one variety, Theresa explains. "That's boring," she says, explaining that "75 percent of a wine must be of one variety to be able to call it by that variety's name. From there, you can blend in other varietals to make the wine more interesting."

After years spent working as a software engineer in Boulder, Nancy Janes and her husband, John Behrs, decided to try their hands at growing grapes in Colorado's Grand Valley. The couple spent two years commuting back and forth between the Front Range and the Western Slope, but finally decided to relocate to Palisade and wholeheartedly plunge into the winemaking industry. The result of their hard work is the rafting-themed Whitewater Hill Vineyards & Winery, which is well worth a stop on your next road trip west.

The Space: Perched atop its namesake hill, the winery has a commanding view of carefully pruned vineyards that sit in front of the dramatic Book Cliffs (which delineate the Grand Valley's northern edge.) Housed in a modern warehouse, the tasting room is a casual space with a long tasting bar and a series of small wine-related merchandise displays.

The Rockies provide a viticultural mountain climate, too, with vineyards at some of the highest elevations in the world. In the Grand Valley AVA in the western part of the state where cherry, peach, and apple trees grow, Sue and Doug Phillips run Plum Creek Winery, which they founded in 1984. Four years earlier — the minimum amount of time it takes for a young vine to bear grapes fit for wine — they planted their 11-acre vineyard with grapes like cabernet franc, riesling, and gewürztraminer, thinking if other fruit thrived there, so might grapevines. In the successful decades since, varieties like sangiovese, sauvignon blanc, and syrah have been added to the mix, and the terroir has been compared to France's Rhone Valley and parts of Germany. Today, Plum Creek is Colorado's oldest still-operating winery, with a total vineyard size seven times the original. The Phillips' sites also include plantings of chardonnay in Colorado's other AVA, West Elks, where vineyard elevations reach close to 7,000 feet. There, bottles reflect the high-altitude, cool climate side of the grape variety.
